7. Please describe how your Public Computer Center(s) promotes economic recovery in your area, such as through providing job training, access to job searches, online course offerings, certifications and the like (600 words or less).

The Public Computer Centers (PCCs) are promoting economic recovery across San Bernardino County, an area in which poverty now exceeds 15%. All PCCs offer access to computers and Internet for job searches and resume writing not only to residents of public housing, but also to the public at large, and HACSB has undertaken vigorous outreach in the community to communicate this message to everyone. People may also access job training and placement assistance via the PCCs, and as a result of these services 145 people have secured employment since the project began.

HACSB has contracted three socially and economically disadvantaged small business (SDB) concerns to deliver services as part of this project. They are: Surveillance, Protection, and Investigation Group, Inc. (security); Sunwest Printing, Inc. (printing); and Clayton-Morrow, Inc. (monitoring and reporting).

9. Please describe any best practices / lessons learned that can be shared with other similar BTOP projects (900 words or less).

The project team has found it helpful to "think big" when doing outreach: in 2011, HACSB advertised the PCCs and the services available using banners placed on all buses in the fleet (n=97 buses) of the regional bus service (OmniTrans). When this strategy was implemented, the quarterly number of user visits increased from 12,504 in Quarter2 of 2011 to 16,812 in Quarter 3, i.e., by more than 4,000 visits.
