7. Please describe how your Public Computer Center(s) promotes economic recovery in your area, such as through providing job training, access to job searches, online course offerings, certifications and the like (600 words or less).

Boston Public Library (BPL): BPL is promoting economic recovery through providing computer training to increase people's access to employment opportunities and increase their computer skills so they can apply for a wider range of jobs and be qualified to excel with a wider range of technical skills. We have offered classes in Spanish and facilitated classes in Vietnamese. The computers in our branches are used on a daily basis to facilitate job searches, online applications, resume building, and professional communications.

Boston Housing Authority (BHA): All sites offer job readiness training which includes help with preparation of resumes, cover letters, job leads identification and research in advance of job interviews. Because the centers are very near where residents live, they can come in around their work and child care schedules. At some of the centers, students are using the computers to help them prepare to pass the GED, do homework for their college or after-school programming.

Boston Centers for Youth & Families (BCYF) - BCYF's public computing centers provide a number of programming opportunities to youth and families. Namely, we have a number of after school computer programs that offer homework assistance combined with enrichment. In addition, we offer both senior and adult basic computer skills that will provide them with basic computer skills (MS Office, basic internet navigation) that will be needed in the workforce.

Lessons learned:

Applicable to all grant partners:

- Hiring challenges since our initiative is a partnership around several agencies, it might have been helpful to engage all agencies in identifying qualified candidate; we also could have benefited from more clarity over who the ultimate hiring agency would be. I think building in a flexible approach to staffing up is key.
- Project management challenge one lesson learned here is that each partner really should have one staff person who has both the
  time and expertise to handle this aspect of the grant rather than having it be an additional responsibility for existing staff.
   Change in original personnel was unexpected and we should plan for such occurrences in the future.

BPL: The Boston Public Library has a theft recovery system in place that enables remote monitoring of a computer in the event that it is stolen. When we first deployed the computers we believed an additional helpful security measure would be to lock them down so that they could not access the internet accept through the library's network. This policy however made it so the monitoring system is ineffective once they leave the library network as well. We have since reconfigured the computers so they can access other networks to increase the potential recovery if they go missing. Another challenge we've faced is finding curriculum that can be delivered in one hour blocks. The vast majority of curriculum we found has been designed for longer sessions which we can not support. We've been able to adapt many courses and make them available on our web site for anyone's benefit. The main lesson we've learned is that coordination and support across our large system - for example, raising the skills of lots of our librarians and setting new expectations for service that are requiring additional support to help be realized - is very labor intensive and we really could use more paid help to improve the breadth and depth of our work.

Best Practices:
Training and usage metrics - We have been making changes to our processes for categorizing and collecting training and usage metrics. (1) Categorizing class offerings - We have aligned the way that we categorize classes with the categories used in the annual report. Besides the obvious benefit of simplifying this aspect of reporting, it also helps to assess our training offerings at a high level across the three City organizations that are implementing this grant. A separate initiative to create a common course catalog will provide more depth that will be required for real collaboration. (2) Using Google Docs to collect class and open lab data on a daily basis from individual PCCs - We see the promise of providing metrics that are much more immediate and can help to tune performance at the local level and to identify and address problems proactively.
