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Project Indicators (This Quarter)

1. Please describe significant project accomplishments completed during this quarter (600 words or less).

During this quarter, CFY provided 24x7 bilingual Help Desk support for all of the families in high-poverty schools in the Los Angeles Unified School District who have been served by CFY during the last three years. CFY also delivered Extension Family Learning Workshops to 408 students and their families in 19 workshops across eight schools, and in-depth Teacher Learning Workshops for 168 teachers.

More details about CFY's program operations are as follows:

A. FAMILY OUTREACH

CFY has operated very successful family outreach programs to ensure high attendance at the Family Learning Workshops. At the Family Learning Workshops, CFY's trainers and volunteers inform and motivate families to use their Home Learning Centers and online educational software in order to help their children succeed academically. By tying broadband to their child's success in school, the workshop aims to make broadband highly relevant in order to achieve sustained, long-term broadband adoption. CFY Family Trainers lead the hands-on workshop sessions, and CFY onsite Customer Service Representatives and Volunteers provide families with additional coaching and guidance. Family Learning Workshops are conducted in both English and Spanish.

Specific Family Learning Workshop topics include:

- Introduction (computer set-up, Windows basics, using CFY's 24x7 bilingual Help Desk)
- Internet Guidance (Internet safety, digital citizenship)
- Learning Together (parents' role in learning with their children)
- Using your Home Learning Center (exploration of installed educational software, productivity software, and accessibility tools)
- Using Broadband to Learn Online (exploration of hundreds of free educational software titles curated at PowerMyLearning.com and instructions for accessing free subscriptions of additional software titles)
- Enrolling in Broadband (information about enrolling in local broadband service)

B. TEACHER TRAINING AND SCHOOL ENGAGEMENT RELATED TO BROADBAND ADOPTION

All partner schools agree to have their teachers participate in a detailed workshop about how to use CFY's software to extend learning beyond the classroom, and CFY provides these teachers with intensive, hands-on experience with the CFY educational software. Based on the results of the teacher workshop evaluations and talking to schools, we have found that teachers are excited to incorporate learning technology into instruction in new ways. Many report particular success in using CFY's tools to provide engaging homework assignments that reinforce key concepts and provide students' with extra practice.

Quotations from school leadership and teachers in the last quarter include:

• "Thank you to you and your entire team for supporting such a high-quality day for our families. You could see the enthusiasm and gratitude on the faces of the families as they left. It was such a pleasure to work with you all, and I hope to continue to strengthen our partnership going forward. Thank you!" – School Principal

• [Blended learning] breaks the routine, so instead of whole-group where I'm just teaching and it's teacher-centered, the classroom is more student-centered. Basically, students are in charge of their learning. They are independent. It empowers them to be leaders in their own education, and that's very powerful."- Teacher

C. FAMILY BROADBAND ADOPTION

Through our follow-up phone surveys conducted after the Family Learning Workshops, CFY staff has captured very significant positive broadband adoption statistics, as detailed below.

At the same time, some families have not adopted broadband to date. The leading reason is that it's too expensive, while some other families have stated that the risks of the Internet do not outweigh the potential benefits. In order to address the price issue, CFY helps provide families with information about different broadband pricing options. CFY also is working to make contact with local broadband companies to secure discounted Internet for our families. In addition, we are looking at ways to equip families to overcome this obstacle. For example, we provided some Home Learning Centers equipped with wireless capability to students who live in LA City Housing Projects that have free wireless broadband.

In order to address families being fearful of the Internet, we have provided additional training to our Family Trainers (who lead the Family Learning Workshops) to talk about Internet safety in a balanced way, in order to ensure that we are empowering parents to use

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the skills that they already have to keep their children safe online, and to continue to emphasize the value of the Internet.

The total of new subscribers of 5,740 is less than the baseline of 7,935. CFY had projected that it would be able to offer families discounted broadband, and at this point, CFY has not been able to secure a discount broadband partnership. Therefore, although CFY has achieved significant numbers of new broadband subscribers, certain families for whom the monthly price is the biggest barrier to broadband adoption have not enrolled as planned.
