Dear President Fowler:

On behalf of the University of Wisconsin Colleges (UW Colleges) and University of Wisconsin-Extension (UW-Extension), we would like to express our strong support for your BTOP – Public Computing Center Grant being submitted for federal stimulus funding. As both of our institutions serve the entire state of Wisconsin, we fully realize the importance that access to the internet and technological resources are crucial to the sustainability of communities. Over the years, we have worked with the College of the Menominee and the Menominee Nation and we believe that our collaborative efforts could be significantly enhanced through the development of the Public Computing Center.

UW-Extension and the UW Colleges have a variety of resources that could be accessed by a wide range of local citizens with the creation of a Public Computing Center. For example, the computing center would allow area residents to access a wide number of online programs. These programs could be degree completion programs that would provide local access to individuals who have completed Associate degrees at the College of the Menominee but have not completed a baccalaureate degree. Additionally, a Public Computing Center could provide online access to the UW Colleges Online program which could provide online courses to students who have not completed an associate degree at the College of the Menominee. Indeed, access could be provided locally to online programs around the state, the region, and the world. An “Access UW” portal could be established so that users have access to all UW degrees, and credit and non-credit certificates. These certificates would be programs that could align with the interests and needs of the College of the Menominee region. Sustainable Management, Business and Green Building are examples of certificates that would complement the Sustainability efforts at the College of the Menominee.

Expansion of facilities to support Community Education offerings could expand collaboration around economic development and family living issues. For example, the Public Computing Center would be a great place to have people gather for the “Building Communities” webinar series, or learning about e-commerce which is part of the National e-commerce Extension initiative, or for teaching basic computing and internet skills. Additionally, the UW-Extension Small Business Development Center could use the location to work with entrepreneurs interested in creating business plans.

In conclusion, the examples cited above are only a few of the many opportunities that could be provided through the College of the Menominee, UW-Extension, and UW Colleges collaboratively. We support

the College of the Menomoneie proposal to develop a community computing center and think it would have tremendous benefit to the people residing in the northern region of the state.

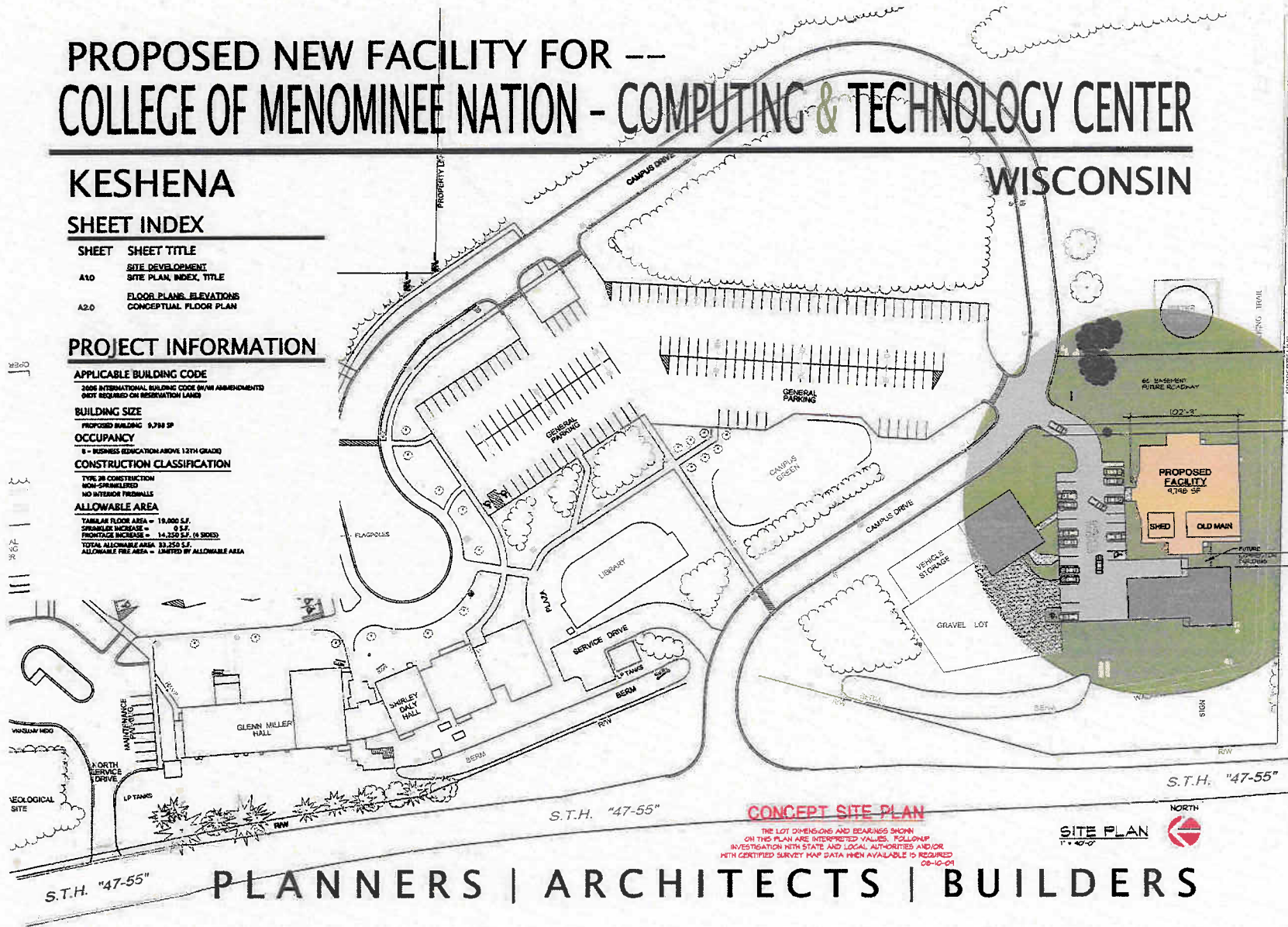

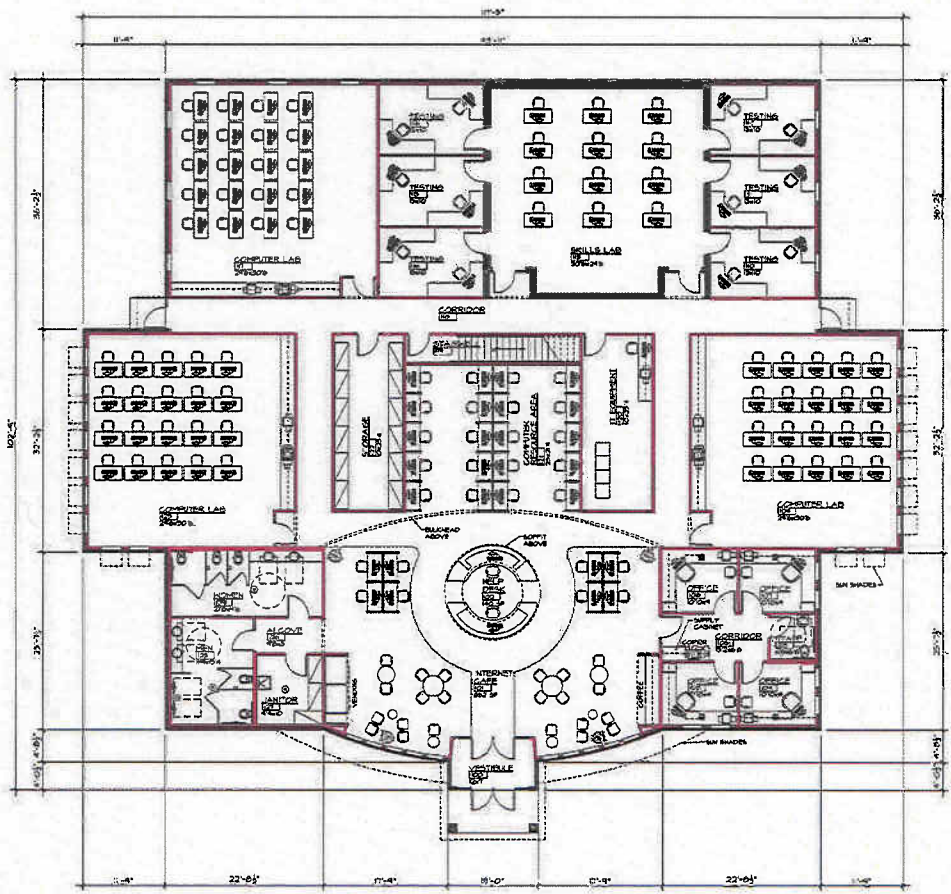
