




## **Poverty**


The poverty rate in Arkansas in 2003 was 16.0 percent, compared to 12.5 percent for the U.S. (Census Bureau estimates). Within Arkansas, the 2003 poverty rate ranged from 9.4 percent in Saline County to 29.1 percent in Lee County.



The Economic Research Service classifies counties as persistent poverty counties if they experienced poverty rates of 20 percent or higher in each census from 1970 through 2000. There are 386 persistent poverty counties in the U.S., and 17 are located in Arkansas (3 metro and 14 nonmetro counties).



I am pleased to write in support of the funding application that Connect Arkansas has submitted to the Broadband Technology Opportunities Program.

With this funding, Connect Arkansas will implement the Sustainable Broadband Adoption project. This effort is designed to address youth and adult technology education, healthcare education, and entrepreneurship economic development. Specifically, Connect Arkansas will implement a public education program that focuses on students in grades 5 through 12, using the internet to teach them about entrepreneurship. The parents of these students will also engage in technology training through the program. Additionally, Connect Arkansas will partner with the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences to deliver an education awareness program that supports the adoption of telehealth and broadband technology in the delivery of health care in 57 impoverished counties in Arkansas.

According to the 2008 State New Economy Index produced by the Information Technology and Innovation Foundation, Arkansas ranks 48<sup>th</sup> overall in its ability to compete in the new economy. The indicators include workforce education, in which Arkansas ranks 48<sup>th</sup>, and an online population where Arkansas ranks 47<sup>th</sup>, avowing "the number of people online is probably the most basic indicator of a state's progress toward a digital economy." In an independent study conducted by Connect Arkansas in 2008, only 49 percent of the population subscribed to broadband service, while another 29 percent had never used the internet. Given the results of these two studies, it is critical that programs such as the one Connect Arkansas has proposed are implemented.

The Arkansas State Library looks forward to participating in the BTOP Sustainable Broadband Adoption and the complimentary Public Computer Center application also being submitted.

The Arkansas State Library's primary mission is to serve as the information resource center for all state agencies, legislators and legislative staffs; to provide guidance and support for the development of local public libraries and library services; and to provide the resources, services and leadership necessary to meet the needs of the citizens of Arkansas. Collaborating with Connect-Arkansas in this effort will allow us to expand upon the role of libraries as providers of services/programs to the citizens of Arkansas and as community anchor institutions.


