

Nevada Copper, Inc. supports Lyon County School District (LCSD) plans to apply for a Broadband Technology Opportunities Program (BTOP) grant in Lyon County being administered by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA), Department of Commerce.

We understand that the District proposes to expand broadband services throughout the 2,016 square miles of rural community in Northern Nevada. We foresee that this will greatly facilitate education and training that will be needed to develop the skills needed to support economic development in Lyon County. Nevada Copper has initiated evaluation to develop a major new mine near Yerington and certainly see how secondary, post-secondary and adult education can be greatly enhanced by such service. Absent such a service, local workers will not be able to access some of the very specialized educational opportunities that are most often only available via Internet access.

We believe that this program will achieve the following objectives needed to support robust economic development in Lyon County:

- Substantially upgrade service to community anchor institutions;
- Deploy broadband infrastructure and incorporate a public-private partnership among government, non-profit and for profit entities, and other key community stakeholders, this rural area that is critically lacking such services. Nevada Copper is seeking to partner with various community organizations to develop a qualified workforce. We will seek to hire local people, but they will need specialized skills to qualify for those opportunities;
- Bolster growth in this economically distressed area. Forty-five percent of the student population is currently on the free and reduced lunch program and unemployment rate for Lyon County is at 16.5%, currently the second highest unemployment state in the country;

- Western Nevada College would also be able to access remote learning opportunities being developed by mining industry organizations at international, national and regional levels that would otherwise be unavailable to local post-secondary and adult students;
- The majority of skilled and professional workers in the mining industry today structure their work with a high level of Internet-based services and tools. These include mining engineers, safety and environmental professionals, operators of highly computerized mining and mineral processing equipment, equipment maintenance, human resources and finance. Every one of these requires a high level of technology training and Internet skills. The broadband infrastructure would not only facilitate education in those disciplines but also in basic Internet skills. They would learn by doing during their educational curriculum;
- Improve access to local people to understand the economic, environmental and social benefits and costs of mine development. Nevada Copper will be conducting an exhaustive analysis of social, technical and environmental benefits and impacts associated with its proposed development. One of our objectives is to have an open and transparent process of development with the local community. Much of the information will be communicated via the Internet. Expansion of broadband will greatly enhance the ability of local people to access this information and understand what we propose.

We look forward to working with LCSD and other local community organizations to develop a world class mine project that will:

- Provide direct and indirect economic benefits to the community;
- Pay substantial local state and federal taxes;
- Provide economic opportunities to workers that will in turn support the school district with a viable tax base to operate;
- Strengthen the domestic supply of critical minerals; and
- Enhance national security.

Most importantly it will both provide jobs, a sustainable economy and protect the social infrastructure and natural environment of Lyon County.





Nevada Copper, Inc. supports Lyon County School District (LCSD) plans to apply for a Broadband Technology Opportunities Program (BTOP) grant in Lyon County being administered by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA), Department of Commerce.

We understand that the District proposes to expand broadband services throughout the 2,016 square miles of rural community in Northern Nevada. We foresee that this will greatly facilitate education and training that will be needed to develop the skills needed to support economic development in Lyon County. Nevada Copper has initiated evaluation to develop a major new mine near Yerington and certainly see how secondary, post-secondary and adult education can be greatly enhanced by such service. Absent such a service, local workers will not be able to access some of the very specialized educational opportunities that are most often only available via Internet access.

We believe that this program will achieve the following objectives needed to support robust economic development in Lyon County:

- Substantially upgrade service to community anchor institutions;
- Deploy broadband infrastructure and incorporate a public-private partnership among government, non-profit and for profit entities, and other key community stakeholders, this rural area that is critically lacking such services. Nevada Copper is seeking to partner with various community organizations to develop a qualified workforce. We will seek to hire local people, but they will need specialized skills to qualify for those opportunities;
- Bolster growth in this economically distressed area. Forty-five percent of the student population is currently on the free and reduced lunch program and unemployment rate for Lyon County is at 16.5%, currently the second highest unemployment state in the country;

- Western Nevada College would also be able to access remote learning opportunities being developed by mining industry organizations at international, national and regional levels that would otherwise be unavailable to local post-secondary and adult students;
- The majority of skilled and professional workers in the mining industry today structure their work with a high level of Internet-based services and tools. These include mining engineers, safety and environmental professionals, operators of highly computerized mining and mineral processing equipment, equipment maintenance, human resources and finance. Every one of these requires a high level of technology training and Internet skills. The broadband infrastructure would not only facilitate education in those disciplines but also in basic Internet skills. They would learn by doing during their educational curriculum;
- Improve access to local people to understand the economic, environmental and social benefits and costs of mine development. Nevada Copper will be conducting an exhaustive analysis of social, technical and environmental benefits and impacts associated with its proposed development. One of our objectives is to have an open and transparent process of development with the local community. Much of the information will be communicated via the Internet. Expansion of broadband will greatly enhance the ability of local people to access this information and understand what we propose.

We look forward to working with LCSD and other local community organizations to develop a world class mine project that will:

- Provide direct and indirect economic benefits to the community;
- Pay substantial local state and federal taxes;
- Provide economic opportunities to workers that will in turn support the school district with a viable tax base to operate;
- Strengthen the domestic supply of critical minerals; and
- Enhance national security.

Most importantly it will both provide jobs, a sustainable economy and protect the social infrastructure and natural environment of Lyon County.
